Happy New Year Everyone!


I hope this finds you and your families enjoying what 2025 brings each of you.

FROM THE QUARRY



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The first Quarry meeting for Mohave Lodge 68 officially took place on Jan 28th, 2025, at 8 o'clock PM.

The Quarry is a men's mental health gathering amongst brothers which was built on the idea that checking in on our fellow Masons demonstrates one of our greatest tenets, that of brotherly love. Being given the privilege to facilitate these meetings here at Mohave 68 was an honor I took seriously and as a mental health

professional I wanted to create meetings that addressed men's health in ways appertaining to Masonry yet also staying aligned with proven psychological ideas and techniques studied and used for personal growth. Equally important was the need to keep this meeting light yet productive, I therefore tried creating an atmosphere of safety, openness and comradery, and I created a subject matter and opening question to begin dialogue amongst the brothers and keep our discussion on point.

This month, the subject was "What does it mean to be a man? What is Masculinity?". The group was asked to think of a time in their youth which they took with them into manhood, and which helped shape them as men. As we think upon Masonry, we must ask ourselves; What makes us good men? Furthermore, how does Masonry make us better? One clear answer is that through the progressive moral science of Masonry, the charges we swear to, and the oaths we give, we can see the importance of emotional intelligence and the role it plays in masculinity. Emotional Intelligence is the ability to understand our emotions and the emotions of others and the ability to control and mitigate our own emotions. It is also the ability to express emotions in meaningful and healthy ways.

Masons, being men who embrace ideas like love, fraternity, and charity, understand the importance of caring for others and the joy that it brings. This meeting highlighted the fact that making a lodge a place where brothers feel safe and accepted allows us to put into practice those great moral duties inculcated within our ancient wisdom. It also showed that within the words and symbols of our great order lie deeper truths that can lead us to further growth and insight. Finally, we saw through our conversation, the lessons of masonry allude to a need for emotional intelligence being practiced in our daily lives. It demonstrates that this is perhaps a key component to masculinity and that through this practice, we might better learn to subdue our passions and live happier, more fulfilling lives. I look forward to our next meeting and to seeing even more brothers join us!

Well done on earning our Master architect award last Masonic year. This year we again have our sight set on the:

Master Architect Award

A. Ritual Component

- 1. A minimum of 3 members provide 3 different lectures in a tyled lodge, (Lectures are EA, Staircase, MM).
- 2. A member of the Lodge must be able to give the Apron Presentation, 'G' Lecture, King Solomon part, and Hiram, King of Tyre.
- 3. Lodge must exemplify all 3 Degrees during the awards year with a minimum of 6 parts performed by lodge officers.

B. Masonic Education Component

- 1. A minimum of 3 masonic education programs are held by the lodge (other than at a Stated Meeting, may be at lodge or virtual).
- 2. Lodge must have a masonic education presentation before, during, or after a minimum of 6 Stated meetings.

C. Lodge Operations Component

- 1. Lodge hosts a tyled meeting with another Masonic Lodge.
- 2. Lodge issues a newsletter a minimum of 8 times during the year with submission to Grand Lodge for Trestleboard recognition.
- 3.-Lodge must have a website that is updated monthly with submission to the Grand Lodge for recognition.
- 4. Lodge hosts an informational session open to the general public.
- 5. Lodge has a program to contact nonattending members and members in jeopardy of Suspension for NPD.

- 6.-Lodge shows an annual increase in Membership of at least 1 Master Mason
- 7.—Lodge has a Masonic Funeral
 Team (WM, SW, JW, Chap) and
 conducts a minimum of 1 practice
 or funeral ceremony.
- 8. Lodge has a Long-Range Planning committee that meets a minimum of once every 3 months. The committee must have established goals and objectives.
- 9. Lodge has a membership recognition program (Mason of the Year, with lodge winners submitted to Grand Lodge for statewide recognition).

D. Lodge Representation Component

- 1.—At least 2 Lodge Officers attend the Grand Lodge Education Conference (Masonicon Arizona).
- 2. At least 3 members of the Lodge attend the 2025 Grand Lodge Communication (2 must be the WM, SW, and/or JW).
- 3. At least 4 members of the lodge attend a meeting of a Masonic Youth Group (where possible) or an Eastern Star or Amaranth open event (2 must be the WM, SW, and/or JW).
- 4. Lodge must be active in a recognized Local community activity.
- 5. Lodge attends a minimum of 2 other Masonic Lodge's meetings (stated or called) with a minimum of 6 members attending (2 must be the WM, SW, and/or JW).
- 6. Lodge has a program for Bikes for Books, CHIPS, Public Schools Essay contest, recognition of community organizations and or individuals First responders, schools and teachers.
- 7. Lodge must host a fund-raising activity for a Masonic Youth Group (or a recognized local youth group if there is no local Masonic Youth Group in the community). This cannot be substituted for the local activity noted above.
- 8. A minimum of 4 Master Masons (2 are non-Lodge Officers) attend a Lodge of Instruction (LOI) conducted by/under the auspices of the Grand Lecturer.

The Freemasons Are the Oldest Fraternal Organization in the World

Freemasons belong to the oldest fraternal organization in the world, a group begun during the Middle Ages in Europe as a guild of skilled builders. With the decline of cathedral building, the focus of the society shifted. Today, "Freemasons are a social and philanthropic organization meant to make its members lead more virtuous and socially oriented lives," says Margaret Jacob, professor of history at the University of California, Los Angeles, and author of Living the **Enlightenment: Freemasonry** and Politics in Eighteenth-Century Europe. Grounded in the Enlightenment, the organization "still conveys [the era's] core values, religious tolerance, thirst for knowledge [and] sociability," says Cécile Révauger, a Freemason, historian of Freemasonry and professor at the University of Bordeaux.

While not a secret society, per se, it does have secret passwords and rituals that originate with the medieval guild, says Jacob: "In the original guild, there were three stages: Apprentice, Fellowcraft and Master Masons who oversaw everyone working on a site. Today, these degrees are more philosophical."

Did you know? The Regius Poem, or Halliwell Manuscript, contains the earliest reference to Freemasons and was published in 1390.





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
